The June 2018 meeting began with an invocation delivered by Former City Councilor Shelli West and followed with the Mayor leading everyone in the Pledge of Allegiance.

The following items were on the agenda:

- Approved a request from the Cattlemen's Saloon to waive the Liquor License application fee for an event being held on June 29-30, 2018
- Approved a request from the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 4116 Auxiliary to waive the Liquor License application fee for an event being held on September 8, 2018
- Approved a request from the Miss Rogue River Pageant Directors for a donation to the Miss Rogue River Scholarship Program in the amount of \$500
- Approved a request from the League of Oregon Cities for a donation to the League of Oregon Cities Foundation to help provide scholarships for Mayor's and City Councilor's in the amount of .05 cents per capita or \$111

# The Mayor's Corner Let 'Em Crow!

I hope you all had a Happy Crow and a Safe and Happy 4<sup>th</sup> of July. I'm writing this on the Thursday before Rooster Crow Weekend so it's still an unknown if we're going to have a blistering hot weekend or just a hot weekend! At least there aren't any forecasts for rain or thunderstorms! And it looks like a mild 4<sup>th</sup> is being predicted – perfect BBQ, picnic, boating, or just plain relaxing kind of weather!

We received some VERY disappointing news this week. Our grant application to do the improvements to Rooster Park didn't make the cut – there were approximately 40-applications totaling over 13-million dollars all vying for just under 5-million dollars that was available this year. Nearly all of those that were awarded grants were for less money than we were asking for and they had significant amounts of funds of their own to contribute to their projects. So next year will bring another chance to apply and we'll hope that the competition isn't quite so tough.

On a brighter note, I want to thank everyone who received an Income Survey and replied! There were an impressive number of them returned and we will now be able to use the data for a variety of future grant opportunities.

### When is the Best Time to Water?

With the advent of drought, heat waves, and water restrictions, it is now more important then ever to use water in the most efficient and effective manner when watering your lawn. In order to do this, it is important to understand the obstacles to doing so: high heat, evaporation, wind, lawn diseases, and politicians (water restrictions). So here are a few guidelines you can follow: How would you like to improve your lawn? Make it greener? Eliminate patches? Less weeds? Make it thicker?



Always try to water your lawn in the early morning. By early morning, I'm referring to around 5:00 a.m.! This is the BEST time for watering, bar none. Early morning watering is best due to: the lack of evaporation that takes place, low winds that can blow you lawn dry, high humidity and morning dew that adds to the moisture. Early morning watering helps to prevent lawn diseases that can be caused by watering at night because it gives your lawn time to dry by night fall. Obviously, this can be best accomplished with a sprinkler system, unless you just can't sleep, especially during the summer months. If you have just planted a new lawn, you will usually need to water once a day so the seeds can germinate and a good solid root system can form. On average, this can last from 2–8 weeks, depending on the type and grass and season.

Try watering a day before mowing if you plan on mowing your lawn and hate the browning that forms on the crowns (tips) of the grass afterwards. This will allow your lawn to recover from the cutting and help it to look nicer as a result.

If you have recently fertilized your lawn, especially with a granular (dry) fertilizer, then you may want to water a few extra times, especially during dry and hot summer months. This can help the fertilizer take hold and aid in preventing the fertilizer from "burning" the grass.
